Scottish advocates accuse Boris Johnson of undermining rule of law

Boris Johnson's comments on "left-wing criminal justice lawyers" is part of a strategy to undermine the rule of law in the UK, the Faculty of Advocates has claimed.

The inside story on how organised crime gangs took over Scotland's illegal trade in puppies

IT'S little wonder that organised <u>crime</u> has moved in on Scotland's dog trade. Just look at how the price of a puppy has changed in only a few decades. Back in the mid 90s, a pedigree puppy cost around £50, before Covid the price had risen to about £800. Today, it's around £2000-3000. A kilo of street cocaine comes in at around £40,000 - that's roughly the price of 10 high-end French bulldog pups. Two gay men in their 30s were assaulted and robbed by a group of thugs in a city centre street during a suspected homophobic attack. Call for Greenock jail to be replaced as leaky roof closes cells

Inspectors have called for one of Scotland's oldest jails to be replaced as soon as possible after a leaking roof forced the closure of 40 cells. Greenock prison was built in 1907 and is operating at 75% of its design capacity due to the condition of its buildings. Wendy Sinclair-Gieben, HM Chief Inspector of Prisons, said a replacement was still expected to be a decade away. - https://www.bbc.co.uk/news/uk-scotland-58005882

Fifty-two prisoners in close supervision units 'that may amount to torture'

Fifty-two people are being held in prison units in England and Wales in conditions that a UN human rights expert has said may amount to torture, the Guardian has learned.

Close supervision centres (CSCs) hold some of the most dangerous men in the prison system in small, highly supervised units within high-security jails in conditions <u>previously described by the prisons inspector</u> as "the most restrictive ... with limited stimuli and human contact". - https://www.theguardian.com/society/2021/jul/26/52-held-close-supervision-prison-units-may-amount-torture

Drug deaths hit record level for seventh year in a row - here's what the data shows

Drug-related deaths in Scotland have hit record levels for the seventh year in a row, with 1,339 people dying in 2020.

It is the largest number of drug-related deaths since records began in 1996 and the highest number of people dying as a result of drug misuse in Europe.

Low-traffic neighbourhood schemes halve number of road injuries, study finds

London neighbourhoods in which low-traffic schemes have been introduced have seen road injuries fall by half, research has found. Flash floods will be more common as climate crisis worsens, say scientists

Flash flooding of the type <u>seen in London this weekend</u> will become a more common occurrence as the climate crisis worsens, scientists have warned, and the UK government, businesses and householders must do much more to protect against future harm.

Dr Jess Neumann, a hydrologist at the University of Reading, said: "Flooding from intense summer rainfall is going happen more frequently.
