'Toxic culture of sexism' in police, says former police chief

A former police chief has said she would think "very carefully" about reporting a crime committed against her because of how she would be "judged". Susannah Fish, former chief constable of Nottinghamshire Police, said there was a "toxic culture of sexism" in significant parts of policing.

Non-fatal strangulation to carry five years in prison under reforms

Ministers will make non-fatal strangulation a specific criminal offence punishable by five years' imprisonment following pressure from campaigners. The number of transgender people who hide their trans identity at work has risen sharply in the past five years, research has shown.

According to <u>a report</u> by recruitment firm TotalJobs, almost two-thirds of trans people, 65%, believe it is necessary to keep their identity secret from colleagues to feel safe and secure in their jobs. Glasgow minimum alcohol pricing study shows effect on men and women

Alcohol campaigners have said that a new study showing minimum pricing is less effective at targeting problem drinking in women backs their call to raise it further.

Joseph Rowntree Foundation report calls for Scottish Child Payment to be doubled in wake of 'huge harm' caused by pandemic

Officials must double the Scottish Child Payment if they are to have any hope of hitting their own poverty targets on time, a stark new report from the Joseph Rowntree Foundation (JRF) has concluded.

Life expectancy gap rises between most and least deprived in Wales

The gap in life expectancy between the most and least deprived parts of <u>Wales</u> has increased, particularly for women, new research has found.

Women in the most deprived parts of Wales can expect to live approximately six years less (life expectancy 79 years) than those in the least deprived areas (85). The 'LitterCam' that's watching you

CCTV cameras will soon have a new target - litter louts. Al software can now match footage of motorists throwing rubbish to their car's number plate and issue an automatic fine of £90.
