- Police and Fire Reform (Scotland) Act 2012
Section 32 - Policing principles
The policing principles are—
 - a) that the main purpose of policing is to improve the **safety** and well-being of persons, localities and **communities** in Scotland, and
 - b) that the Police Service, working in collaboration with others where appropriate, should seek to achieve that main purpose by policing in a way which—
 - i. is accessible to, and engaged with, local communities, and
 - ii. promotes measures to prevent crime, harm and disorder.

A Snapshot of Daily Incidents Dealt with by Police Scotland *



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Incidents Recorded Every Day

▲ An increase from 4430 in 2015/16



People are booked into Police Scotland Custody Centres every day



People reported missing every day



Incidents recorded on the Vulnerable Persons' Database every day



People booked into Police Scotland Custody Centres advised that they have a Mental Health concern

Over half (54%) returned to custody in the same year



Incidents Related to Mental Health

▲ An increase from 157 in 2015/16



People reported missing had experienced a mental health concern

This represents 26% of missing persons overall

Missing people were recorded during the 2018-2019 fiscal year



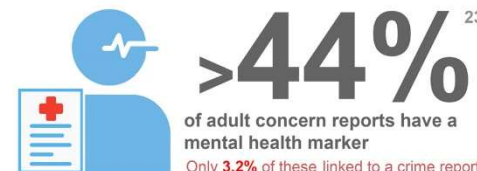
63%¹⁷

Of missing people are children
31.7% are 'Looked After' children



92%¹⁸

Of 'Looked After' Children reported missing were repeat missing people



>44%²³

of adult concern reports have a mental health marker
Only **3.2%** of these linked to a crime report



3pm-11pm²⁴

The peak period for this demand is between 3pm - 11pm, **7 days of the week**

- *Values and rights based approach*
- *Designed with service users*
- *Acute and unscheduled services minimised*
- *No unnecessary criminalisation*
